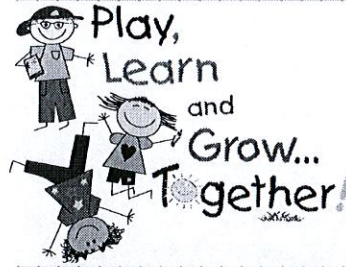
Q125 Randolph History Books are for sale at the Library.

2nd and 3rd graders are you ready to be left home alone for a short period of time?

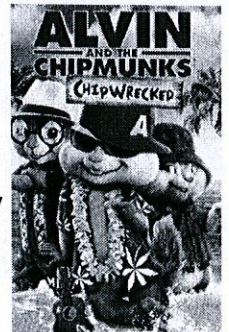

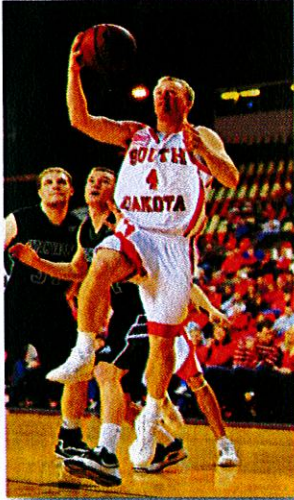
